Our Purpose

The Davidson Historical Society promotes an understanding and appreciation of the history of Davidson, North Carolina and its surrounding area.

Methodist Church Renovates Chapel and Neighboring Structures

Summoned by the recently-reinstalled bell of the Chapel of the Davidson United Methodist Church, on September 21st the members and friends of The Davidson Historical Society convened in the newlyrenovated chapel for the opening program of the Society's 2003-2004 year. A group of 40 people listened with great interest as Ed Beam talked about the history of the nearly 100-year-old chapel. He also talked about the history of the adjacent building, known for years as the Sloan house, then as the Cathey-Hoyle Funeral Home and now as the DUMC Molly McKay Youth House. Built in the 1870's, this is the oldest house still standing on south Main Street. Ed and his family lived in the old church for seventeen years before moving, in 1988, to live in the house next door.

In the new brightness of the chapel, Ed described the original church, built when 99 members of Mt. Zion Methodist Church founded Davidson Methodist Church. In the 1940's the lay people of the church built four Sunday school rooms behind the original sanctuary. Ed told stories of a trap door in the wall behind the organ and of unannounced visitors who mistook him for the Methodist preacher.

In 1947, William A. Cathey began a funeral business from the Sloan house with his brother-in-law, Robert Hoyle. They brought the first ambulance to the town of Davidson. Over the years many Davidson College students, especially those in premed studies, lived in this house, assisting Mr. Cathey with the business and learning

from him. The funeral home closed in 1972. Mrs. Ruth Cathey continued to live in the house until moving to a retirement home in Charlotte, at which time Ed and Janis Beam moved their family into the home.

In 2001 the Beams sold the buildings to the Davidson United Methodist Church and renovations began. Jim Hawk, who was in charge of that project, described some very interesting facets of that renovation. The renovators had hoped to preserve the original ceiling, but were unable to because it needed to be raised. They discovered bales of hay were being used as insulation above the ceiling. The present ceiling, made of pine with a pickled finish, is very similar to the look of the original. The renovators were able to remove and preserve all of the

Sunday, January 18, 2004 Historic Mt. Mourne – In the Midst of Change

Lewis Alexander, chairman of the Iredell Historic Properties Commission, and O.C. Stonestreet III, Iredell County historian, will discuss the historic sites of the Mt. Mourne community and the challenges to preserve them in the midst of development. This historic community is undergoing major changes prompted by the construction of Lake Norman Regional Medical Center and the Lowe's Corporate Campus. The Mt. Mourne community, which developed around Centre Presbyterian Church (est. 1765), includes several antebellum plantation homes and the site of the Revolutionary War skirmish at Torrence Tavern.

Sunday, March 21, 2004 Davidson: Namesake of General William Lee Davidson

The minutes of the Presbytery of Concord for August 1835 record "It was resolved that the Manual Labor Institution which we are about to build be called Davidson College as a tribute to the memory of that distinguished and excellent man Gen. Wm Davidson, who in the ardor of patriotism, fearlessly contending for the Liberty of his country fell (universally lamented) in the Battle at Cowan's Ford." Who was this "universally lamented" gentleman and what role did he play in American and North Carolina history? Come find out, when Dr. Malcolm Lester, Professor Emeritus, will discuss the life and legacy of Gen. William Lee Davidson, for whom both the town and college were named.

original stained glass windows. Because many of the windows had been donated, portions of the windows were framed and given to the families who originally donated them. Part of one of those windows now hangs above the original communion table and plans are being made for other uses of the original glass. Working within today's building codes, they were able to create new, attractive and versatile spaces while maintaining the historical integrity of both the chapel and the former funeral home.

Ed Beam and Jim Hawk concluded the meeting with a tour of both buildings. With these interesting talks the Davidson Historical Society enthusiastically began its new year!


