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

The Houston House of Davidson

This past June, DHS hosted a wine and cheese open house at the historic Houston house, to help Needlecraft Center owner Elaine McArn kick off her 40th anniversary. The Houston house, 102 S. Main Street, has been the home of the Needlecraft Center since 1971. To follow up this event, we wanted to share some history of the house and of Dr. E. Q. Houston and his family.

The Houston house and attached storefront (now the Soda Shop), was built by Dr. Erwin Quitman (E.Q.) Houston after the Davidson fire of 1906. Prior to the fire, Dr. Houston had been living in a large, frame house and working as postmaster in a frame store building in the front yard of the same lot. During the last quarter of the 19th century, the house had been known as the "Brady House," a boarding house run by Mrs. Martha Brady and later her niece, Lillie, whom Dr. Houston had married. After the fire destroyed both the house and the post office, Dr. Houston rebuilt both, this time using brick and connecting the two buildings so that he could walk directly from one into the other.



E.Q. Houston was born in 1858 in the nearby Mount Mourne community. He was the son of George Sidney Houston and his second wife, Margaret Donaldson Houston, and the grandson of Captain James Houston. In fact, Dr. Houston used an old hearthstone bearing his grandfather's initials, J. H., and the date 1798 as the front step of his Davidson home, which is still there today.

In 1888, E.Q. graduated with distinction from the University of Virginia School of Medicine, completing his course work in one year. Directly after graduating, he returned to Davidson

An Afternoon with Andre Michaux 4:00 pm

DHS is pleased to host special guest Andre Michaux, Royal Botanist to King Louis XVI of France! Michaux (portrayed in costume by Charlie Williams, esteemed Michaux historian and Charlotte librarian) will share stories of his journeys through the Carolinas in the late 18th century.

André Michaux was the most famous botanist of his time, or any other time, to come to the United States to study our native plants. He explored eastern North America from Quebec to Florida in the years between 1785 and 1796. His base was a garden near Charleston, S.C. and between 1789 and 1796 he traveled through the central Carolinas seven times. He discovered, described and named hundreds of plant species new to science and is also credited with bringing the crape myrtle, camellia and other southern garden favorites to America.

DHS is pleased to partner with ReadDavidson to present this program. This year's book selection is "A Walk in the Woods" by Bill Bryson.

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to practice medicine with Dr. Paul Barringer, of whom he had previously been a pupil. He later served on the faculty of the NC Medical College in Davidson. In 1894, Dr. Houston opened a drug store with Dr. Mott, one door down from the post office (present day Soda Shop), on the site of the current building which is home to "Classic Bride" and "Monkees on Main" stores.

E. Q. Houston married Lillie Brady Freeze, a widow, in January of 1893. They had three daughters: Myrtle (1893-1922), Flossie (1895-1961), and Lillian (1897-1978). Lillian married John Davidson Foard, and Floss married J. Boyd Hatley.

Lillie Brady Houston died in 1905. In 1910, after remarrying and retiring from his position as postmaster, Dr. Houston left his downtown brick home and moved into a new frame house at 602 North Main Street, which builder B.C. Deal constructed for him. In 1913, he and his second wife, Hattie Turner, had a son, Paul Barringer Houston (1913-1988.)

Dr. E. Q. Houston died in 1916. He had served the Davidson community not only as a medical doctor, but as postmaster from 1899 to 1910, and town commissioner from 1912-1916. He is buried in the Davidson College cemetery, along with his first wife, Lillie, and daughters, Myrtle and Floss.


In 1922, the post office was relocated and the building became home to a dry cleaning business. In the early 1940's, the building took on its present role as a soda shop when J.B. and Floss Houston Hatley moved back to Davidson and into the brick Houston house, running the soda shop in the adjoining store.

Mary Fetter Stough
1923- 2010

Mary Fetter Stough was a long-time member and board member of the Davidson Historical Society. She served the DHS in various capacities over the years: Historian, Vice President and President.

Mary Fetter was born in Davidson, but went on to earn a PhD from the University of South Carolina and teach English literature at Atlantic Christian College. She left her tenured position to return to Davidson to care for her mother. Mary Fetter lived in her childhood home on N. Main St until she moved to The Pines in 2000.

Through the years, Mary Fetter combined her writing talent and her love of history by writing numerous articles on local history.

Mary Fetter Stough was a unique character in a small town full of characters and we will miss our dear friend.
