Street Smart

As you travel the streets of Davidson, have you ever wondered about the stories and people behind some of the names? Many of our streets are named for people or families that have been a part of the town's rich and unique history.

**Griffith, Sloan, Beaty and Jackson Streets** are all named after Davidson mayors:

James Lee Sloan, Jr., a local businessman and Davidson College graduate, served as mayor from 1900-1920. Known as "Mr. Jimmy Lee," he was instrumental in the founding of cotton mills in town.



Thomas M. Griffith served as mayor from 1933 until his death in 1940. During his time as mayor, **Griffith Street** was more of an alley. By the 1950s, it was the access road to Highway 21 and by the late 1960s it was one of the main entrances to town from the newly constructed I-77.

Ernest Beaty was a Davidson College graduate and a professor of Latin and German

at Davidson College. He completed Griffith's term and was elected as mayor in October 1941. After resigning as mayor in January 1946, he ran again and was re-elected in May 1947. He resigned again in May 1951, after being appointed to the County Board of Commissioners. His daughter, Mary Beaty, wrote books on the history of the town and the college.

Frank Lee Jackson, was another Davidson College graduate, as well as the college treasurer and local business owner. He served as mayor from 1951-1969. **Jackson Street** was originally called Railroad Street and only ran from Depot Street to Delburg Street. When the street was extended to South Main Street in the 1980s, it was renamed in his honor.

#### Tour of the Copeland House Members only Sunday, March 20, 4:00 pm 305 North Main Street, Davidson

Built in the 1870's around an older structure, the Copeland house is among the oldest homes in Davidson. A wellpreserved example of an Italianate-style dwelling, it was the residence of the town's first medical doctor, and served as a boarding house for Davidson College students for over 100 years.

Jan Copeland Hampton will discuss the history and future of this historic home which has been in the Copeland family since the 1940's.

Other Davidson streets which recognize individuals are:

Watson Street is named for a man actually named Watson Street. A Davidson graduate, Watson Street served as a pastor of Unity Church, the mill church established in 1890 where the Reeves Temple AME Zion church is currently located. In 1927, Davidson College students began serving as pastors for the church. Watson Street was the student pastor in 1937, staying on after his 1938 graduation and leaving in 1939.

Lorimer Road, which was a new street in the mid 1920s, was designated Shelton Heights and T. Watson Street Faculty Heights before officially becoming Sloan Street. In 1933, the town council changed the name of the street to "Lorimer" in accordance with the wishes of the residents. "Lorimer" was the middle name of William Lorimer Porter, a Davidson College professor, who had built the first house on the street in 1925.

J.B. Shearer

**Shearer Street** takes its name from Dr. John Bunyan Shearer, president of Davidson College from 1888-1901. This street may have once been part of North Main Street. For years, North Main Street crossed over the railroad tracks just south of the present day Beaty Street intersection. By the 1920s, North Main Street had been straightened in order to meet the Public Highway being built from Mooresville on the east side of the railroad tracks. An African-American community known as Shearer Town, after Dr. Shearer who had built and rented residences there, was located nearby and may be the reason this particular street came to have his name.

Several other streets took their names from local families:

**Thompson Street** was named for the oldest house on the street, the Thompson family home, built around 1870. No other homes were built on this street until the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

**Potts Street** was originally part of South Main Street. Prior to the 1920s, the section of South Main Street that proceeds down the hill from Walnut Street and under the RR overpass did not exist. In order to follow South Main Street towards Cornelius, it was necessary to take a sharp right turn just south of what is now the DUMC Youth House, head west across the railroad tracks and then south along what is now Potts Street. When South Main Street was straightened in the 1920s, the street was renamed for the Potts family who lived for many years in one of the oldest homes on the street.

**Grey Road** was the road to the W.R. Grey farm. William Richard Grey graduated from Davidson

College in 1880 and was a professor of French and Latin at the college for over 40 years.

There are many other streets in Davidson which bear the names of local families such as Gamble, Goodrum, Cathey, Armour, Mock and Jetton. Do you know the story behind these or other street names in Davidson? If so, we would love for you to share it with us!
